Dear friends,

I grew up in Mid Wales but have spent the last 16 years in South Somerset where I met Janet - who spent much of her early years in Scotland. We've been married 13 years. Janet has three daughters in their mid-twenties and we have four grandchildren aged 11, 8, 7 and 2 who will be visiting in the holidays.

As I write, we're still in Martock (just to the west of Yeovil) – a slightly larger village than Wrington (though with fewer shops). So we seem to be permanently surrounded by packing cases and disorder - you know what moving can be like! Ahh! So we're looking forward to the end of May.

Moving always brings out a range of emotions, doesn't it: the sadness of farewells (knowing there'll be some people you'll never see again), the excitement of pastures new and fresh starts, the nervousness of leaving established friends and family (particularly in Janet's case as she's lived around Yeovil for over 40 years!!!).

However, in all this transition, we have the constancy of God.

behold, O LORD, you know it altogether.

So we come to you – nervous and excited, but confident in God's call on our lives.

News from Wrington Primary School

There is strong evidence that regular physical activity is associated with numerous health benefits for children and adults, and at Wrington CofE Primary School we are committed to helping children to develop and maintain healthy and active lifestyles. As well as offering an 'Active Mark Gold Standard' PE provision, we offer our children the opportunity to participate in a wide range of extracurricular activities designed to get children engaged, inspired and active!

The children themselves have created a fabulous 'den building' area on our school field, which has evolved over many months from a few sticks to a freestanding dedicated play area, overseen by Mrs Willis, our dedicated LSA. This unique area gives children the opportunity for delightful collaborative play in a wonderfully creative and natural environment.

As well as our carefully managed conservation area and fabulous school grounds, we also have a dedicated raised vegetable bed and composting area, which children can access at playtimes, as well as within specific lessons, to develop both knowledge of how plants grow, but also to foster a longstanding enjoyment of gardening and horticulture; a pastime which has been recommended to promote well-being and to act as an antidote to our modern hectic lifestyles.

As a whole school, we celebrate Well-Being Week, Sports Relief and also participate in the national Walk to School Week in May and we have extended this to challenge to encourage all children to Walk on Wednesdays. Children are invited to join our Walk a Mile Club during lunchtimes, which, now that the weather is brighter, will certainly be even more popular! Playtimes for our youngest children have been further enhanced by our brand new stock of playground equipment, funded through a grant from Tesco's BagsofHelp scheme; which includes a huge range of resources from dance scarves and skipping ropes to footballs and bean bags. The importance of fitness and exercise is also reinforced through our range of afterschool clubs and lunchtime provision, which is supported by Future Stars, who offer specialist PE coaching and staff CPD.

We are also getting to grips with some rather entertaining classroom APPs, which are designed to get the children up and active during lesson time; to wake and shake, and to keep up the energy levels even whilst practising spellings or learning times tables!

All these energetic activities will no doubt help the children to prepare for the eagerly anticipated annual Wrington Fun Run, which will be held on Sunday 13th May, organised by our wonderful school PTA, supported by Cadbury Country Club. We hope to see you there!

Views from Christ Church, Redhill

Please forgive me if this month's article springs from a rather personal turn of events. My prayer is that this simple tale may bring you hope.

I write this article on the evening of the feast of Ascension, when we celebrate Jesus returning to be with His Father in Heaven. There is a chapel dedicated to the Ascension in Wallsingham (Norfolk), which has in the ceiling above the altar the image of two feet poking out from the bottom of a cloud. They are intended to show how Jesus was lifted from the earth, passing up through the clouds, to heaven. Such representations have led to Ascension being treated with less respect than it might, dismissed as having nothing to do with the realities of life.

So it was on this day, Ascension Day, when I should have been celebrating Jesus ascending to heaven, that I found myself saying goodbye to my earthly Father, who passed away about 2:30 in the morning.

My Father was named Noel, as he was born on Christmas Day, the festival at which we celebrate Jesus coming to earth from heaven. The symmetry and elegance in my Father's birth and death on these particular Christian festivals gives me cause to smile. It gives me joy.

The loss of a loved one is always a painful event and this was no exception. I miss him terribly, but may I not make the mistake of being sorry for him.

The bedrock of the Christian Church is the hope of something beyond the mystery and the misery of this earthly life. The Ascension of Jesus is important as it points the way to that 'something more'; what we often refer to as 'Life after death'. The Church is full of symbols that try to aid our understanding of, and our hope in, this wonderful promise of God.

My Father was a man of simple pleasures, he had a simple faith and in many ways lived a simple life; no more special than anyone else; no less special either. But the significance of the dates of his birth and death just happen to highlight a most amazing hope in which we can all share.

Christ Church is a simple church with a simple purpose, to hold out to you that same hope, to make that hope a meaningful reality in your life.

Burrington C of E Primary School

We are very fortunate that our school is in such an idyllic location with lovely grounds for sport and recreation. We recently enjoyed a delightful afternoon celebrating May Day with each class performing different Maypole dances from the traditional 'Barber's Pole' to the complex 'Spiders' web'. We welcomed parents and staff to join in with the dancing and the sun even shone too!

The concern for the future of our planet is important to everyone at Burrington Primary. To raise awareness and help children protect and look after the environment, Burrington has established a Forest School led by Rosie Price. We have been so grateful for the hard-working efforts of Burrington's PTA, which have allowed us to purchase a new forest school shed to run weekly sessions for young children to learn in an outdoor environment. We are also hoping to expand our forest school provision to work with our older students in the future.

Burrington has recently launched several other green initiatives to raise funds and awareness, including taking part in Duracell's National Big Battery Hunt. During the Big Battery Hunt, the children collected 1000s of batteries and, in just 6 weeks, had enough to fill up 4 large tubs, each weighing over 15 kilograms. As part of the event, the children learned how batteries can be recycled to protect the environment.

Green issues are an important part of our Early Years curriculum too and if you visit our school at the moment, you will notice a 'garden centre' and a giant beanstalk have appeared in the corner of our nursery and reception classroom! Recently Cherry Tree Class enjoyed a very exciting day at Lower Stock Farm with Farmer Nick. The children explored the farm and had fun planting seeds; however, it was the transport there and back on the trailer which I think was a real highlight of the day!

Year 6 are looking forward to their special Leavers' trip to London soon where they will be visiting the Natural History Museum and seeing some of the capital's famous landmarks.

For this special weekend, arrangements are put into place by the relevant authorities for the children to spend two nights away from home and be entertained as guests of the Rotary Club.

Another activity taking place is taking a group of children to Longleat Safari for the day; the children are nominated by the schools and are considered to be recipients who would benefit most from such a visit. To assist older children in their development, schools arrange for mock interviews to take place under conditions similar to job applications. Members of the club assist in this exercise by conducting the interview and explaining what to expect when they undergo live interviews.

Andy Wolf Solo Swim of the English Channel 2018

For those who do not know me, I have lived in Wrrington for 18years and worked for over 20 years in the Intensive Care Unit at Bristol Children's Hospital looking after babies and children needing cardiac surgery. Last year I swam across the English Channel with a group of paediatric doctors from the "Kids Hospital" to raise funds for a purpose-built facility for hospice care within the hospital.

Having swum across as a relay in 2017, I have rashly decided to swim the whole distance as a solo swim of the channel in 2018. I have assembled a support team, coach and booked the Pilot boat for this ultimate test of cold water swimming. Times vary from 8 hours to 28 hours depending on weather and tides. Although at 63yrs I am one of the older swimmers to take on this challenge, I have been training hard all winter and have now completed the qualification 6-hour swim in 15.5degC in just a pair of speedos, a hat and goggles.

I am undertaking this challenge to fund a unit that can make 3D copies of the hearts of children with congenital cardiac disease: to plan the operations, practice the proce-

dures and allow the surgery to be properly explained the problems to parents and children. This technology will also allow us to build actual parts that grow with a child (bioprinting) and we are on track to deliver this.

My websites are now live and you can follow my progress in training. I will have a twitter page up soon from which the swim itself can be followed live. The swim should happen in August, but it can be delayed for a week or two with the weather

North Somerset Council

Petition on Proposed 20mph speed limit

Wrington Parish Council is running a petition to ask North Somerset Council for a 20 mph speed limit in Wrington village in order to increase safety for residents walking in the village. NSC has agreed in principle to a 20mph speed limit but only to a more restricted area. Wrington PC proposes a wider area covering roads without pavements where pedestrians feel at risk when vehicles pass them travelling at 30mph.

The black lines and hatched areas on the map (page 23) show the area proposed by Wrington PC. So far NSC has only agreed to the black lines on Broad St & parts of High St, School Rd, Silver St & Station Rd. Also Ladywell & Old Bell Court!

It is important that the hatched areas are included in the scheme.

High St – the hatched area runs from the pump to West Hay Rd. This stretch is steep, narrow, has no pavements & a blind bend. It is the route to and from Alburys, parts of Ropers Lane including the United Reform Church, and Yeomans Orchard.

School Rd – the hatched area runs from South Meadows to Orchard Close. It is steep, has no pavements & is near a bend. It is the route to and from Orchard Close, parts of Ropers Lane (& URC) and the Wrington school entrances on School Rd and Orchard Close.

Silver St – the hatched area runs round the bend at the Rickyard Rd junction. It has no pavements & a blind bend. It is the route to and from Garstons, Lawders Orchard, Rickyard Rd and Coxs Green (with 59 more houses proposed) and the recreation field with Sports and Social Centre.

Station Rd – the hatched area runs from Brooklyn to The Glebe. It has no pavements. It is the route to and from Butts Batch, Kings Rd, The Glebe, Westward Close, the dentist and the veterinary practice.

If you agree with Wrington Parish Council's proposed 20 mph speed limit then please sign the petition at Amors, Buglers, the Treasury, Mother Hen coffee shop, chemist or dentist, BEFORE 22nd July.

On Our Farms

What a difference a year makes. This time last year I was writing about a prolonged dry and warm spell in March and April. March and April this year were two of the coldest, wettest months at the back end of an already wet winter many could ever remember.

The poor weather has had a knock on effect. Field work was delayed by anything up to a month. When the weather and ground conditions improved the farming fraternity went mad trying to get work done.

Spring is always busy. Slurry and farm yard manure is applied to grassland in February to ensure a plentiful supply of nutrients to help the grass to grow. Fertiliser is applied to grass and arable crops soon after to provide nutrients for optimum growth.

Grassland cultivations start in late February and early March. Lovely stripes appear in grass fields after chain harrowing and rolling has been done preparing for the season's silage and hay making.

Fields are ploughed in April and cultivated ready for maize seeds to be sown when the soil starts to warm up. Arable crops are sprayed with fungicides and growth regulators to ensure optimum yields of nutritious feed for animals and humans.

And then magic day. The forage harvesters are ready to roll at the start of May and silage making starts in earnest. As well as all this activity, baby lambs should be seen gambolling around the fields enjoying the spring sunshine and cows turned out from their winter quarters to graze the lush pastures of the Wrington Vale.

What happened this year? Nothing until half way through April. You try fitting two months work into two weeks playing catch up! So where are we now? Most of the slurry and farmyard manure was applied. Some spring cultivations were done but a lot less rolling and chain harrowing than normally which may result in dead grass and soil getting picked up in the silage. All the fertiliser and sprays were applied albeit late. It may mean some crops will be later maturing and yields might be affected due to foliar disease. Lambs were turned out to grass but spent the first few weeks of their lives trying to avoid rain and snow by hiding under hedges. The cows stayed put in their winter quarters until the grass had grown enough to provide them with enough to eat each day. And silaging was started, albeit three weeks later than hoped for.

The modern farmer has an armoury of machines, tools, technology and knowledge to help produce large amounts of highly nutritious food. No matter what we have at our disposal, the one thing we can't control is nature. There is no point competing with it as we'll never win. We just have to go with the flow and understand (hope) that through the course of the year everything equals itself out and comes right. Let's hope 2018 is a case in point.
