### Views from Christ Church, Redhill

Harvest has been and gone, so the summer is really over and it is time to tidy up our gardens ready for the onset of winter. Our churchyard too will be subject to a number of tidy-up sessions, trimming back and sweeping up. We have a Churchyard Clean-Up Party on the morning of the fourth Saturday of every month; all are welcome. There are lighter duties, such as weeding around the flower beds, and heavier duties as in cutting back the hedges and large shrubs that encroach further and further each year. We call it a 'Party' because it is fun, sharing with others in a bit of physical work in the open air. If you like the sound of it, do come and join us 9:30-12:30.

It's not just our gardens and our churchyard that need a pre-winter tidy up, but also our lives. Over the chaos of summer; with holidays and visitors; our normal routines can fall by the wayside and the sense of balance in our lives can be lost. We do all the things that need doing, but are we also giving time to the less urgent, but equally important, things that we would like to do. I mean the things that, when we look back on the year, we may regret not having made time for. In my case it is spending time with my children and grandchildren, also a bit more 'Me Time' reading. This is the right time to survey where our time goes and decide whether routine work has encroached too much on our lives, just like those hedges encroach on the lawn.

The church refers to this time when we turn to interests other than our work as Sabbath, or Sunday. Wait a minute, you may say, the Bible refers to the Sabbath as a day of rest! Is it not based on the Creation Story, when God spent six days creating the world and all that is in it, and on the seventh day He rested? The answer is 'Yes' and 'No'. Yes, He rested on the Seventh Day, He ceased His work. But also 'No', because the Bible is clear that the Sabbath/Sunday is not to be treated as a day of enforced idleness, just not the same old work as the rest of our time. It is a time of ease, it is a time of reflection, it may also be a time of helping each other.

The essential message is that we do not allow our weeks to become a continuous round of grinding work. Your Sabbath may be a Sunday, or a Saturday, or an hour each evening, but we need to find some time when we can step off of the merry-go-round of work. And October is a really good time to try to do this.

May the love of God and the hope of Jesus Christ be a blessing in your life

Then you are welcome at Venerate - a monthly evening occasion when we share in lively worship, have coffee (often with cake) . Normally on the 2nd Sunday evening, the next is **13th October at 7.30pm.** 

SUNBEAMS: Lively tots at home? Bring them to Sunbeams where they can play safely together whilst mums and dads chat. Wednesday mornings at 10am during term time. Who knows, you may make new friends.

- **SUNDAY WORSHIP** is at **9.30am.** You will be given a warm welcome, and can sit, stand, sing, pray as much as you like. We share in Communion (Lords Supper/Eucharist) on the second Sunday each month. We record most of the teaching on Sundays, to be accessed through our website. So, even if you hear something you're not sure about, you can check it out.

There we learn, laugh, support and encourage each other as we try to work out what this Christianity is about. - **PRAYER**: We try to care for each other in our chapel and in our community. But we also pray - a lot. Whether you think prayer is worthwhile or not, we do. So, we hold a prayer meeting every month. We also have an active group of dedicated people who take the time to pray for much of what goes on in our village. ### Bristol Mercury August 1841

**Wrington Bazaar**. – The bazaar at the rectory, Wrington, held in aid of the funds for erecting an Episcopal Chapel at Redhill, took place on Tuesday and Wednesday last. It would be impossible to bestow too much praise on the ladies of the committee for the taste displayed, both in the decoration of the apartments and tent, and for the quantity, variety and elegance of the articles on their stalls. Among the curiosities offered were some texts of scripture in the hand-writing of her Majesty the Queen Dowager, and an ingenious model of "Barley Wood", the residence of the late Mrs. Hannah More, cleverly worked in wood and straw by a youth of the village, named Charles Challenger.

The unfavourable state of the weather on the second day caused a profusion of beautiful and valuable articles to be left on hand which, as will be seen by an advertisement, will be sold at the Boys' National School-room, at Wrington, on Tuesday next.

### Bath Gazette August 1841

**Teasel Crop.-** It is with much regret we notice the great rot and failure of the teasel crop, caused by the heavy rains of late. The principal parishes for the growth of this article are Wrington, Blagdon, Churchill, Congresbury, Winscombe and those immediately in that neighbourhood. There is hardly a plot of ground with this valuable article, on which the teasels are not entirely rotted. The deficiency will be most severely felt by the labourers at the approaching winter, especially as this crop gives so much more employment than any other agricultural produce. It is considered by the best judges that there will not be a pack per acre cut in this county, and that those will be of wretched quality.

### **Bowls Club**

#### Did you know.....

The earliest documented use of the word 'Jack' in a Bowls context is by William Shakespeare from Cymbeline (thought to have been written in 1609) when he caused Cloten to exclaim, "Was there ever man had such luck! When I kissed the jack, upon an up-cast to be hit away." Some believe the origin of the word "Jack" is derived from the Latin word 'Jacka' ~ meaning a cast or a throw. However, the most popular theory is that Jack, in some contexts, means a slightly smaller version of something. For example a jack-rabbit is a little rabbit. In this case a 'Jack-Bowl', was the little bowl, later shortened to 'Jack'. In 1697 R. Pierce wrote "He had not Strength to throw the Jack-Bowl half over the Green".

# On Our Farms

When farmers measure their level of success more often than not it includes crop yields, milk yields, prices achieved, new trees or hedges planted and maybe an increase in wildlife species if they are that way inclined. After the prolonged drought of 2018, success in 2019 has been measured by how much feed has been produced to replenish stocks. I'm pleased to report, subject to a half decent crop of maize, most farms will have full clamps and silos again ready for the coming winter. It's not without effort or cost and for the eagle eyed, you may have noticed an extra cut of silage being made on some farms and combines rolling late into the night gathering a really good crop of grain. So far it has been a case of the seasons cancelling each other out so the hardship of 2018 being comforted by good conditions and good crops in 2019. Let's hope it continues.

As I've noted before, rather than buying tonnes and tonnes of fertiliser, the majority of farmers measure the level of nutrients in the soil, assess what nutrients the growing crop needs and apply manure and or slurry to provide as many of the nutrients as possible. This year this has been especially important trying to grow extra crop. In an organic system this is the only source of nutrients other than what the plants produce in the form of nitrogen. In a non-organic system, with mineral fertiliser (man made from fossil fuels) being allowed there is the luxury of being able to 'top up' when manure nutrients aren't enough on their own. Unfortunately this comes at a perceived cost to some in the form of odour. The majority of the consuming public acknowledge and accept that to reduce the carbon footprint of food production this is a key tool in achieving these aims, and it has been for hundreds of years. There are some however who take exception to farmers storing and spreading these manures and unfortunately if a complaint is made about it to the authorities they are duty bound to investigate. I'm sure I'd much rather put up with a week or so of smells spread through the year than rely on depleting resources and either growing food using man made fertiliser or worse still felling rain forest in south America so our 'problem' is exported.

On a more positive note, I've had some recent involvement with a small family farm that produces some of the nicest ice cream I have ever tasted. Chew Moos is run by the Parfitt family in Dundry. They have conducted sound market research, developed a fantastic range of products and all from less than 30 cows. It just goes to show, you don't necessarily need to be big to be successful. You need a great idea, a burning desire to succeed and in their case, lots of people who enjoy ice cream.

#### Mendip Spring Garden Village

Following the inspectors recent criticisms at the hearing of the joint special plan (JSP), a detailed second letter has been received by NSC for consideration. The four councils that make up WECA (West of England Combined Authority) will now consider the technical details and their implications before submitting a response to the Planning Inspectorate.

I along with other local councillors are lobbying the Executive to use this opportunity to conduct a full comparative review of potential locations and their proximity to strategic transport links and employment infrastructure etc.

If, like me, me you do not wish to see 3000 houses built in Churchill and a possible dual carriageway cutting its way across our fields, the inspectors findings are good news. However, we do need to create a strategy for house building across the region or we will be at the mercy of developers for years to come.

After an unacceptable level of service over the summer, NSC requested the waste contractor (Biffa) put in place a number of measures to rectify the situation. The service has started to settle down over the last couple of weeks (with a few exceptions!)

Headteacher Chris Hildrew said: "This is another excellent set of results. This year at Churchill we have been keen to emphasise the importance of finding a balance between school work and extra-curricular activities, so that our students could manage the stress of exam season. It's great to see that excellent results can be achieved when the wellbeing of our students is prioritised. Our success is testament to the partnership between our expert staff, our dedicated families, and the efforts of our wonderful students. I am very proud of them all, and I look forward to welcoming many of them into our successful Sixth Form in September."

Alongside the consistently strong performance in Mathematics, excellent results were achieved in GCSE Business Studies, Economics, Food and Nutrition, Music and Religious Studies. Applications to join the Sixth Form are also open, with an Open Evening taking place on 13<sup>th</sup> November.

# A concise history of the village of Wrington

Noting important events and Characters from 904 AD By George Brooks PART 4

#### <u>War in Wrington – the Great and</u> <u>Second World Wars</u>

When Germany invaded into Belgium in 1914, Great Britain was quick to respond. During the war, 15 sons of Wrington gave their lives across 5 fronts: France and Belgium, Gallipoli, Bulgaria and at sea. Most of the men served in the New Armies, created by Secretary for War Lord Kitchener. Cpl Edward John Buncombe, LCpl Alfred Hewer Perry and Pte Albert Vowles all served in the 13<sup>th</sup> Regiment of Foot, the Somerset Light infantry which was the local regiment. Others went further afield, including to the Artillery, the Royal Navy, the Royal Marines and regiments of neighbouring counties.

When Germany invaded Poland in 1939, Wrington was about half the size it is today with a population of only 1,500 people. Thanks to the lack of supermarkets, Wrington was prosperous; with butchers, boot makers, bakers and general grocery stores. Radios, bicycles and electrical goods were repaired locally and the garage hired out cars. The village was served well by three local pubs – *The Plough, The Golden Lion* and *The Bell*, the former two still remain open today. At the outbreak of the war, special constables, air raid patrols, auxiliary fire services and a company of Home Guard were formed or expanded in Wrington. There was no shortage of people willing to serve. Salvage initiatives also received generous donations from Wrington.

The nearest Wrington ever found itself to any Germans was when a Heinkel 111 was shot down and landed in a field near King's Road. The crew bailed out and were captured by the Home Guard. The then ten-year old Gladys Brough, local resident, remembers the plane coming down and how the boys all rushed out to grab souvenirs before the Army arrived to take control of the scene.

Wrington also took its fair share of evacuees, 190 in total. Whilst special constables had the power to force evacuees on a home, all 190 people were housed by volunteers, testament to Wrington's generosity. Parents of evacuated children would come to visit as often as possible, usually at weekends by special bus service. This must have been a logistical nightmare as well as very emotional.

Come the end of the war, most evacuees had returned home already. Victory in Europe day was celebrated with a large bonfire, music, dancing, singing and general good cheer from all.
